Executive summary

The Problem

The pressure on parishes to maintain their buildings and increase their mission are arguably greater now than at any time in the past. Recognising the purpose and role of these churches and whether they are perceived as a blessing or a burden to those who look after them is key

The church buildings review was started in a pre-covid world and concludes as we tentatively emerge from this world changing pandemic. Pre-covid many churches were struggling and this pandemic with subsequent temporary church closures has exacerbated the situation moving many more churches to a more vulnerable position. As the pandemic unfolded so did the parameters of this review such that it includes and now leads with an up-to-date response

Rather than creating a strategy we have produced a strategic toolkit which parishes can utilize as much or as little as required and which will be undered


Deanery buildings audit

Every church has a record on the CHR (Church Heritage Record) which links through to the OFS (On line Faculty System). These records tell us:


- their Grade if they have one
- their size, if they are listed
- whether they are on the HAR (Heritage at Risk Register)
- whether they have any renewable technology by which we mean solar, ground source heat pumps etc.
- Quinquennial Reports, and
- any permissions that have been sought for work done to the church or its churchyard.



- We have over 550 churches in our Diocese, we are the fifth biggest in the country
- Our churches sit within 4 Archdeaconries, and within them sit 28 deaneries.
- and our churches range from less that 100m2 upto over 1400m2.

We have this data for each of the 28 deaneries, so when we combine the information together we can then use it to view the whole diocese.

When we also add in data about congregation size, or deprivation scores, it helps add detail about whether churches might attract grant funding for maintenance costs.

This information will help us as we continue to look for ways to support our church congregations as they maintain their buildings for mission.



Module one

Early Intervention Protocol



The current situation

- Some congregations have shrunk.
- Some churches are weary.
- Some churches have used up their financial reserves paying for ongoing costs (insurance, heat, water and parish share).
- For some churches the repair costs of their building feel unattainable.
- And some are raring to get on, but aren't sure where to start.



Which churches have contacted the Diocese directly with concerns about viability, which churches have the Diocese been aware of for a while, and which churches have the deaneries through SfM identified as no longer being fit for purpose.



Of those, which churches will be difficult to save because of a combination of repair needs, small congregations and low finances?

More information should be gathered on these three areas, and the option for a church to make an argument for saving should be included.





Of those remaining that are of concern, consider the following:

Does the worshipping congregation have the energy to invest in looking at new solutions and trying any that might be appropriate?







- Is the mission of the church growing?
- Is it accessible and does it have suitable facilities?
- Does a geographical area need as many churches as it has?
- Could a worshipping community share its building with a different denomination?
- With the right support could a building have other purposes that may supplement its income and make it more attractive to funders (community organisations, post office, café etc)?
- Could churches either individually or in groups be supported to better engage in church tourism?
- Can it improve its environmental offering on the path towards net zero carbon by 2030?
- Would another model of church help?
- · Are there other options that could be considered?

Consider the process of Closure.

Including: Public Consultation; What alternative Use can be made of the Building; Is it saleable; would a church of a different denomination like to use it. Refer to AMPC (Area Mission Pastoral Committee). See Closing Consecrated Church Buildings diocesan guidance..



If any of the bullet points can be answered **yes**, church to engage with diocesan resources to explore possible solutions. If **no** is answered to the questions above then consider the option of closure.



Early Intervention protocol

- Is the mission of the church growing?
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Available resources

- The <u>Discipleship</u>, <u>Vocation and Evangelism</u> (<u>DVE</u>) <u>Teams</u> can look at mission initiatives.
- The <u>Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC)</u> can advise on whether physical alterations or adaptions to buildings are likely to gain the support of Historic England, the Victorian Society, the Georgian Group etc., all of whose views need to be taken into account before major permissions or faculties are applied for or granted.
- The <u>Parish Support Project Officer</u> can advise on funding opportunities for building repairs and upgrades.



Holistic support

Our churches provide a valuable service both to their worshipping congregations and their wider communities.

- we need to identify the churches that cannot be saved or are no longer fit for purpose.
- we need to support churches as they explore new ideas.
- and we need to work with the churches that are not currently identified as struggling, to look at what they might need in the future.

We have the opportunity to make a real difference. By providing clear guidance and a documented approach, we can work with churches to face the future in whatever guise that may be.


