Lichfield Diocese is one of the largest in the country, covering an area of 1744 square miles and serving a population of more than 2 million.

Homes and schools

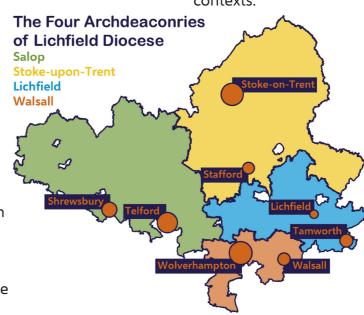
We aim to provide high quality housing for our clergy with a continuous programme of improvements to houses and responsive, specialist contractors for emergencies.

number of higher education centres can be found in Stoke, Keele, Stafford, Shrewsbury, Telford, Wolverhampton and Walsall

Our vision for the diocese is that all people, lay and ordained alike, will grow ever more deeply into their vocation as disciples of Christ. We hope to become a Church where all our members are equipped to know they are called by God to worship and to be the eyes, hands, feet and mouth of Christ in their own contexts.



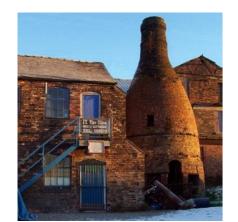

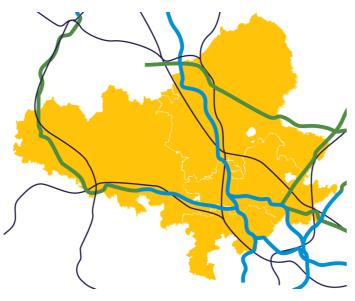
Staffordshire prides itself on being 'the Creative County': Shropshire is the birthplace of the Industrial Revolution and the Black Country is renowned for its industry and all have significant opportunities for spouses who wish to develop careers in any sphere.

For those days off when you need space away from the parish, the area has everything you could wish for – except the sea: wild landscapes, cultured museums and stately homes. Sports of many kinds (including Premiership football) and at least two theme parks

Road and rail links



For those with family and friends in other parts of the country, the Diocese has great transport links: the M6/M6Toll bisects the centre of the Diocese north-south, and the M5 originates at our southern tip. Heading west, the A5/M54 give easy access to north and mid Wales, while the A50, A5 and M6Toll give swift access to the M1, M42 and A38 for the East Midlands and the south-east.

Rail links are also good with all major towns having direct services to London and Birmingham and four major airports surround our borders – Birmingham, East Midlands, Manchester and Liverpool.

Leisure and pleasure

Lichfield Diocese has everything but the sea. For walkers and climbers, there's an extensive network of canals, Cannock Chase, The Roaches, and the Shropshire—Welsh borders (for example). If you're into more organised fun, Alton Towers and Drayton Manor Theme Park

And then there's many museums including Walsall's New Art Gallery and the RAF museum at Cosford; not to mention excellent sporting options for both watching and participating – from premiership football to the Tamworth Snowdome. Along with Wedgwood, theatres and cinemas, restaurants and superb tea shops just begging to be discovered...

The Benefice



Leek is a rural market town nestled at the top of Lichfield Diocese with an approximate population of 20,000 residents. St Luke's and St Paul's are two sister churches at the east end of the town.

St Luke's was built in 1848 and is a grade 2* listed building. It was modernised internally around the time of the millennium providing a two-storey church centre with meeting rooms church office and kitchen and toilet facilities.

St Paul's is located in Haregate, at the far east of the town on Novi Lane. Built in the 1970's it is a church and community centre with a large hall



which is popular with many local groups.

Both churches work together considering themselves to be a single church in two buildings. The church is run by a single PCC and leadership team, with a joint vision and mission statement.

Leek is unusual in that it works with the middle school system. First (reception – yr4), middle (yr5-yr8) and secondary (yr9 – yr13). There are multiple schools, both church and local authority, who are all part of the Talentum Learning Trust (excluding St Edward's) with multiple opportunities for ministry engagement.

Leek's main source of employment was the textile industry. There are many mill buildings still around the town which have been repurposed and Leek is very proud of its textile heritage.

St Luke's and St Paul's are both churches with a very modern outlook. They are seeking to engage with the local communities around them and serve those in real need.

St Luke's has been streaming services since the covid pandemic on zoom, while also posting content onto YouTube.

Services in the churches:

St Luke's and St Paul's have quite a wide range of services and styles serving the congregations in the type of worship that they require.

St Luke's has a formal organ led service at 9:30 every Sunday. This alternates between morning prayer and a communion service with some sung content. At 11:15 is the family service, which is led by a music group and has children's groups for ages 0-16.

St Paul's has a family service at 10am, which draws in from the local Haregate area. There is also a mid-week prayer and praise service every Wednesday evening at 7:30pm. This is very informal, but has a strong focus on spending time with God, and listening to the leading of the Holy Spirit.

Both worship and children's ministries are important to both churches and are valued in our services. There is also a strong lay engagement in both service leading and

Context

Leek is a delightful market town with a population of around 20,000 people. Nestled in the Staffordshire Moorlands, Leek sits on the



edge of the Peak District National Park, close to the dramatically jagged rocks of Hen Cloud, Ramshaw Rocks and The Roaches.

There are many buildings dating from the 17th and 18th centuries and the town is characterised by pleasingly designed buildings heavily influenced by the Victorian 'Arts and Crafts' movement.

The market square and main shopping street hosts a bustling market each week as well as occasional Farmer's Food & Craft markets.

Major employers in the area include Alton Towers theme park and JCB company. In addition, Leek has a proud tradition of supporting independent businesses in

the locality. Large centres of population and employment, such as Stoke-on-Trent, Manchester and Derby, are within regular commuting distance.

Leek has a wide range of sporting facilities, including a swimming pool and leisure centre, Leek Town Football Club, a cricket club, rugby club and hockey club and also a sailing club and rowing club at the nearby Rudyard Lake.

In addition to Alton Towers and as part of the expanding tourism industry in the area, other attractions include the Churnet Valley heritage railway, Peak Wildlife Park, Coombes Valley nature reserve and Tittesworth Water.







The ministry

Mission Action Plan

St Luke's and St Paul's vision and mission action plan were drawn up in 2017 and are currently under review in September 2022.

The current vision is to Seek, Build, Share and Love.

To **seek** God in our worship and praise. To make him the focus of our doing and the reason for our service. To **build** our relationships with each other and the community around us. To **share** our faith with others so that the Kingdom of God grows and to demonstrate our **love** through our actions. To engage with social action and practical acts of service, so our actions match our words.

In 2022 we hope our new mission action plan will direct us to engage with our community by addressing issues like fuel poverty, environmental challenges and social isolation.

St Luke's

St Luke's may be a traditional building on the outside, but is very different on the inside. The church is very forward looking and wanting to engage with the community around it through

its building and facilities, but also through its congregations and their ministries at home.

The church is very much a tale of two congregations. The 9:30 with its older congregation is more traditional in its outlook and approach. However this serves the older community well and has been very steadfast and faithful during the challenges of the last two years.

The 11:15 congregation is both in person and online. The music is contemporary and the ministry with children a key value. There is a real drive in this congregation to minister during the week and grow the kingdom of God, beyond that of a Sunday.

During the week St Luke's runs a parent and toddler group called Seedlings.

St Paul's

St Paul's church is very focused on serving the community of Haregate. The service at 10am is family focused and welcoming to all, but there are currently no children's groups running. It is next door to Beresford memorial school with which it has strong links. Weekly worship is led at the school and termly services are held at St Paul's for children and parents together.

The prayer and praise service at St Paul's is a growing experimental service. Often there is no plan, often instead having a focus on listening and sharing.

St Paul's also runs a uniform bank, serving the whole of Leek. This helps both those with limited resources, but also promotes recycling and prevents waste.

Life Together

The ministry of St Luke's and St Paul's is very much joint. The leadership is that of a single church with two buildings and multiple congregations. Leaders, preachers and volunteers, work across both sites and resources are shared.

There are several homegroups at St Luke's and St Paul's which have varied memberships across the parish and provide a great way of the members mixing.

Recently we had a church weekend together, using both buildings equally. All the congregations came together to share in worship and teaching throughout the weekend and most importantly eating together as a single family.

As well as the large team of lay ministers, the parish also employs an administrator who is based at St Paul's and is charged with keeping everyone organised. Tasks ranging from numerous room and hall bookings to the weddings and funerals that the churches perform.

St Matthew's Meerbrook

St Matthew's is part of the Leek and Meerbrook benefice and is currently in interregnum. However, there is currently informal oversight from Rev'd Matt who is sharing his time with them and providing support. The diocese is currently undergoing a review of clergy allocation and the current plan is to make this informal support permanent. This would provide an opportunity for a curate to experience rural ministry in the small village of Meerbrook on the outside of Leek also.

Leek and Meerbrook Benefice

St Paul's and St Luke's is a part of the larger team Benefice of Leek and Meerbrook. Rev'd Nigel Irons is the team rector (St Edward's, central). But we also have All Saints (in interregnum) which is Anglo Catholic. There will be learning opportunities from the wider benefice to learn more about the wide range







of expressions of church that form the wider Church of England.

Curacy Opportunities

A curacy at St Luke's and St Paul's would provide a candidate to engage with and experience the following.

- Working with multiple congregations in differing buildings
- Experience in a wide range of worship styles
- Learning from a busy and energetic church
- Evangelical ministry with an openness to the work of the Holy Spirit
- Ministry with children and young

The challenges

St Luke's and St Paul's face two main challenges: Like many other churches the covid pandemic has impacted the churches attendance, but also individuals' confidence and energy levels. The challenge will be to recover and grow in new ways as God leads us.

The second challenge is that of finance. Resources are tightly managed, and care has to be taken that what we have is used carefully for God's kingdom



Housing and Accommodation

The Diocese of Lichfield either has a curate's house in the benefice or a 'strategic' house for curates in close proximity of the benefice. These are good houses, mainly with three to four bedrooms. If there is no curate's house in the benefice and where such a strategic property exists within easy reach of the proposed training parish this will be the preferred curate's house. If there is no strategic housing available nearby the diocese is committed to providing appropriate accommodation for all those entering ministry. We generally do not offer rented accommodation except as an emergency short term measure. Our curates can be confident that their home will be of a consistently high standard. If you wish to know further details about the house, the BDO will be able to provide you with more information.

Curacy in Lichfield Diocese

Supporting learning and formation

Curate learning, formation and development is strongly valued and affirmed in Lichfield Diocese. Curates receive ongoing supervision and reflection on ministry in the parish, complemented by our curate-training programme in which you share with your year-group of peers. The aim of the training programme is to enable each person to flourish in their ministry and inhabit more deeply their vocation as deacons and priests. This programme supports learning and formation through a partnership between the Diocese and The Queen's Foundation. And it takes place in the context of parish supervision and reflection on ministry.

The programme provides space and an environment beyond the parish context in which curates come together with skilled tutors to learn with and from each other's shared experience, so that they can better integrate their practice and reflection, develop their personal qualities, spiritual, ministerial and professional gifts and skills, and deepen their desire to learn.

The curacy experience is very much a collective one, often gathering at Lichfield Diocese's centrally-located Shallowford House for study, prayer, retreat and de-stressing with peers (pandemic permitting): as such, it's a much less scary venue during IME2 than as a base for a BAP!

Pattern of training

The programme focuses on grounded and situated learning and prioritises the Diocese's focus on Discipleship, Vocation and Evangelism:

- In Year 1 establishing you in your new ministerial context and practice, and supporting your preparation for ordination as priest.
- In Year 2, deepening your practice and understanding of mission and ministry with the theological tools and skills you need to contextualise this.
- In Year 3 helping you prepare for life-long ministry and to take up a post of responsibility to be entered into with skill and confidence.



IME2 to equip for ministry

At the heart of the programme are residential events which bring together a year-group of curates. They reflect the diversity of the Church, while the different ministry contexts reflect the diversity of the Diocese. This cohort is the primary context for the essential learning and formation to develop your ministries, focusing on ministerial formation, and on the development of relationships which enable mutual flourishing for all.

Opportunities for academic awards

Alongside the IME2 training you may wish to continue studying on an accredited pathway with Common Awards. Curates who already have a Diploma award from IME1 may register for a BA in Theology, Ministry and Mission. Others who already have a degree or higher award or are recognised as potential theological educators have opportunities to further their studies alongside their curate programme.



Care for curates and families

The wellbeing of clergy and their families is very important to us. In addition to the supervisory aspects to curacy, we have a free, confidential counselling service (the Listening Ear scheme) for all clergy, diocesan staff and their families.
